



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
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PRESIDENTS OBSERVATION by Jack Watson



The Stinky Creek is inspired by the Everett and Monte Cristo Railway which was a 42 mile standard gauge railroad which ran from Puget Sound to the gold fields in the Cascade Mountains of Washington State. The Everett & Monte Cristo was financed by a Rockefeller Syndicate. When local surveyor submitted a plan that avoided the water level route along the Stillaguamish River, he was promptly fired by the Eastern Syndicate with the comment that they had been building railroads along rivers in the East decades and that "little trout



stream" was not a problem. They built the railroad along the river and every spring the "trout stream" became a torrent tearing out bridges, washing out track, and roaring through the tunnels knocking out the supports. As a consequence of the whopping annual repair costs and disruption of service the railway never made a profit, and was abandoned in the 1930's.



Gas station modeled from pen & ink drawing of a real station


alternate history, In my railroad was financed by a couple of lumber barons from Michigan. Cutler and Savidge had made a fortune by cutting down every tree over 2 inches in diameter in upper (It was also rumored Michigan. that some of their money came from an illegal business which supplied the loggers with something they wanted but which was in short supply in the woods). Cutler and Savidge were looking for some where to continue their clear cutting when they heard about the gold and trees in the Cascade Mountains. They had the railroad built as designed by the local surveyor. They did not mind the circuitous route because their

plan was to have the ore shipments from the gold mines pay for the railroad so they could ship their timber and lumber for free. The longer the route the greater access to the trees. Thus the Stinky Creek has lots of bridges, high trestles and tunnels. The spring floods were avoided and the railroad prospered. The time is now the 1930's and in spite of the depression the Stinky Creek is operating and bringing some prosperity to the area. The Stinky Creek Railroad and the town founded by Mr. Cutter were named after his Kentucky birthplace.


The Stinky Creek is located in a basement room 13' X 42' It can operate with 5-7 people. Scenery is 75% done, bench work is 100%. The lighting is provided by florescent fixtures with one cool white bulb and one daylight bulb. Control is DCC by Digitrax. I have a base station and a booster with two MP42's which divide the layout into eight electrically sections. (If isolated Ι starting over I would go with radio control). The mountains are plastic castings made from rubber molds. The chemicals and molds are from Bragdon Enterprises. The small pine trees are made from several kinds of furnace filters. They can be mass produced with the help of friends. The big Douglas firs are made from dried caspia inserted into carved balsa wood trunks. Each of those takes about two hours to make. Most of the structures are scratch built or kit bashed but I do use kits where they fit in. Both of the large brick buildings are from DPM modular parts. I use a lot of Grandit Line and Tichy windows. All buildings but one, were made by me.

Operations on the Stinky Creek equals No fast clock, No schedules, No signals, No switch lists, as this is a 1930's back woods lumber and ore hauler. It is point to point through the mountains with a helper district. Motive power is supplied by Shay, Heisler, or Climax. We use a 4 position way bill with car cards to move freight. No effort has been made to operate just like the prototype. This layout is not for the history who wants to recreate car movement on a class 1 railroad. It is for beginning operators and people who just want to have some fun running a train with a logical purpose.

STREET CAR SOUND INSTALL by Howard Andrews

NCR HOW-TO ARTICLE


At the East Penn Meet this year Fred Miller put on a clinic explaining how he added sound to his Town & Country Traction Company using Digitrax's Sound Decoder. After seeing (and hearing!) Fred's sound equipped cars I knew I had to add this feature to my layout. I was completing a Pre-War Air Car from IHP. This is a resin shell with a Bowser drive and represents Pittsburgh Railway Company's 1200 series PCCs. OK, so the sounds are not PCC specific - but I just had to add it to this car. Fred's Clinic that explains the details of his sound project and loading them to the decoder is available on the Digitrax WEB site at http://www.digitrax.com/appnote_sfx_traction.php so I will not repeat those details here.


To get started I did purchase the Digitrax SFX064D SoundFX+Function Decoder (http://www.digitrax.com/prd_mobdec_sfx064d.php) and a PR2 SoundFX Decoder Programmer (http://www.digitrax.com/prd compint pr2.php).

Fred's sound project can be downloaded from Digitrax's Sound Depot (http://www.digitrax.com/depot_traction.php). So, it was a simple mater of using the Digitrax Soundloader program to update the decoder with the Traction sounds and I was ready to begin installation.

As an aside here - if you're interested in adding sound but don't want to purchase the PR2 and/or hassle with doing the computer thing I would be willing to do that for you. You'd need to send me the decoder with return postage and I'll load the sound project and return it to you. You can then use your DCC Command station to set the CV's to manage the sounds.

Well, time to get started. Here's the drive for my car, it is a Bowser unit on the cast floor provided with the car. I have already installed a Digitrax decoder which controls the motor and the lights. The SFX064D only provided sound— so the motor decoder must remain.







The sound decoder is added in parallel with the existing decoder-here's the wiring diagram for my setup. Note that I've put a resistor across the Blue and White function wires on the sound decoder. I found this necessary to be able to read and set the CV in the sound decoder. And, to minimize the resistor heat I set CV33 to 2 which 'turns off' the current to this function.

For the installation of wiring in my cars I use connectors that are designed for printed circuit boards. These are relatively inexpensive at about \$1 each, are easy to solder in and allow the easy separation of car shell from the drive. You can order these on line at Mouser Electronics (http://www.mouser.com). The items I use are:

3M™ .100" Pin Strip Sockets
2 connector part # 517-974-01-02
3 connector part #517-974-01-03
MOLEX KK ® Series Headers (.100")
36 strip connector part #538-22-28-4360
I get the header striped and simply cut it to the proper number of connectors I need.

Adding the connector is very simple - I solder the wires to pins then coat them with Krystal Klear to insulate the connection. The advantage of this is you can strip off the Krystal Kear easily if you need to service the connection - and it's cheap! Here is my connector to pick up the power from the Trolley pole and provide power to the LEDs in the car body for the headlamp and taillamps. Notice that my red wire is power from the overhead - I've connected one wire from the motor decoder and added another that will power the sound decoder.







Here is the chassis complete with the motor/lights decoder and the sound decoder added. Notice that the power to the sound decoder is via a 2 lead connector - this allows me to install it in the car body and even more important isolate it so I can program each decoder separately. Another change made is to remove the speaker provided by Digitrax and replace it with a 0.63" diameter speaker in an enclosure that I purchased from Tony's Train Exchange www.tonystrains.com This is an 8 ohm speaker and the one provided by Digitrax is 32 ohm. advice is to simply turn down the master volume until it sounds good without distortion. This is what I did and it seems to work fine.


With all the wiring complete I 'fold, spindled and mutilated' the sound decoder with it's speaker, capacitor and resistor into the body shell. I found I could get everything to fit at the rear of the car to avoid the motor and power truck in the front. I did need to modify the rear truck by cutting and bending the power pickups until they were below floor level to allow the truck to turn without interfering with the decoder attached to the chassis. In this photo you'll also notice the dropping resistor for the 3 volt LED's used in the headlamp and tail lights.



With everything plugged together PRC 1223 is seen pulling out of the Car Barn area on PRW headed for a day's service in the city. Now, if only you could hear how great the car sounds squealing around the curve and the clanging of the gong.



The HotBox- THE FUTURE! by Barry Hensel NCR INFORMATION

As mentioned in my Editorial, we have some changes planned for this great publication, the HotBox! Some of this information has been "leaked" at a few of the local Division meetings, but here's the scoop, right from one who was involved in these changes and decisions.

FIRST- you have this issue and the Winter 2008 issue (due out in November) that will be printed on paper. Starting with the Spring 2009 issue in February, the HotBox will be all electronic. We do realize that and are sorry this change will cause you some grief in getting the great stories and information that you want. However, let's look at two BIG advantages to this up-coming change- One, the HotBox will now be IN COLOR! Two, the HotBox will be here at all!! As mentioned in President Watson's message, we cannot afford to keep printing the HotBox on paper, 4 times a year, year after year. Printing costs and mailing have simply become more than any income the NCR has or will have. Let's go back to that access concern- if you do not have a computer/internet access at home, this is available at any public Library for free or hopefully some of your model railroading friends that do have access will assist you in getting a copy, or at least reading it online.

SECOND- One of the ideas we looked at is a HotBox that is more informative and has more news, especially NCR news and Division news. At one time, we had "Division Scribes" who wrote a column in each issue and told everyone what was happening in their Division. I would REALLY welcome a return to that!! Please email me if you can be a Division Informer for your Division! It's always great to hear what's happening through-out our Region!

THIRD- One item that has also plagued the HotBox staff is the lack of material to put in the HotBox. This has been a bigger concern as of late. Well, we have another idea for helping that problem. Besides the Division Informer, we want each Division to submit a layout article AND a how-to-do article for each issue. Hold on!... this is easier than it sounds because there will be two Divisions assigned to each issue ONLY! We'll start this in 2009 as well. Here is the schedule... Feb 2009- Div 1 and 9; May 2009- Div 3 and 8; Aug 2009- Div 4 and 6; Nov 2009- Div 5 and 10. How did this schedule come about? If you look at the Divisions and their locations, we have two Divisions paired that are some distance apart. This will give us articles from each end of the NCR in the same issue. I am hoping that would make them more interesting! The Division Informers are NOT responsible for these articles, only their news items, but hopefully they can assist in getting the articles to me. These articles can/should be written by anyone in these Divisions. And remember- you earn points toward your Author Certificate by doing these!

FOURTH- By the rules, we must print and mail an issue to each NCR member, once a year for balloting information and convention information. At this time, I don't believe that will be a FULL issue of the HotBox, but more of a specific mailing of that information. Perhaps a HotBox Jr.??

FIFTH- I'm sorry to report that I, personally, do not know if anything can or will be done concerning past dues and fees for the HotBox. The NCR Board is well aware of this situation and are formulating ideas.

OK... that is a bit of changing, but it's better than no HotBox at all. At least I hope you agree to that statement! We are always open to suggestions, comments and criticisms, so feel free to write, but email is best!

FAST FREIGHT '08 - CONVENTION NEWS NCR INFORMATION

You are invited to attend the 2008 NMRA North Central Region convention being held in Toledo, Ohio, Friday - Sunday, September 19-21, 2008. The convention planning committee is working diligently to provide you with a great convention featuring interesting clinics, layout tours, operating sessions, prototype tours, and several modular layouts in various scales.

The Convention Hotel

Convention headquarters is the Clarion Hotel, which is located on the south side of the Secor Road exit of I-475. The hotel is easily accessible from all directions. The room rates for the convention will be \$72 per night, plus tax. Contact the hotel directly to make your reservations. Their phone number is 419-535-7070. Mention the Model Railroad Convention to get the special convention room rate. The hotel has an on-site restaurant, various meeting rooms which will be used for clinics, a large ballroom which will be used for modular layout displays, and a smaller ballroom that will be used for the model contest. For those not attending the convention activities, shopping and a variety of restaurants are located within a couple of miles. The Toledo Zoo and the Toledo Museum of Art are within easy driving distance.

Layout Tours

Many layouts in and around Toledo will be open for self-guided tours during the convention. A list of open layouts, along with a brief description of each, is being posted on the Division One website. This list is being constantly updated as the committee takes photographs of the various layouts. A layout tour booklet, with detailed maps to the layouts will be part of the registration packet you receive when you check in at convention headquarters.

Operating Sessions

Various operating sessions are being planned for the convention. Some of these are in Toledo, while others are an easy drive from Toledo. The list of layouts available for operation include Doug Tagsold's layout in Blissfield, Michigan, the Blissfield Model Railroad Club layout and the Wabash Operations Road Show layout in Saline, Michigan. A complete schedule of available operating sessions will be posted on the convention website in the spring of 2008, along with a registration form for the sessions. Those who have registered early for the convention will receive a copy of the Operating Session Registration Form a couple of weeks before the form is published on the web site. Slots for the operating session will be filled as Operating Session Registration Forms are received on a first come, first serve basis. There will be a group of preconvention operating sessions on Thursday evening, more sessions on Friday evening, and possibly some sessions on Sunday afternoon. There is no fee for participating in the operating sessions. Membership in OpSIG is not required to participate. Transportation to and from the layouts is not provided.

Proto-type Tours

We have arranged with The Andersons to tour their freight car repair facility. The Andersons maintains one of the largest fleet of privately owned freight cars in the country. The fee for the Anderson's tour will be \$15. This tour will be held on Friday afternoon, leaving the convention hotel at 12:30. Participants in the tour will be back to the hotel in time for the last two clinic sessions scheduled for Friday evening.

Model and Photo Contest

There will be an NMRA sanctioned model and photo contest during the convention. Entries will be accepted all day Friday and until Noon on Saturday.

Convention Awards Breakfast

An Awards Breakfast buffet will be held in the Atrium of the Clarion Hotel on Sunday morning. The keynote speaker will be Allen McClelland, who will talk about his observations of model railroading over the past 50 years. The cost of the banquet will be \$15 per person. Our MC for this event will be local TV personality, Greg Jones of TV channel 13.

Clinics

A variety of clinics are being planned for Friday and Saturday. Preregistration for the clinics is not required. Featured presenters include Allen McClelland (the new V&O), Andy Sperandeo (passenger train operation), Gerry Albers (Signaling and signaling software), and Dan Lewis (model railroad photography). A complete schedule of clinics will be posted on the convention website in the spring of 2008 to help you with your planning.

Modular Layouts

We have the main ballroom at the Clarion reserved for a modular layout display, which will be open Friday and Saturday during the convention. Watch the website for a complete list of modular layouts that will be on display.

Blissfield Dinner Train & Murder Mystery

Would you like a change of pace on Saturday evening? The Adrian & Blissfield Railroad operates a dinner train and murder mystery on Saturday evenings. They have agree to set aside a block of tickets for the convention until the middle of August, 2008. Tickets are NOT being discounted for convention attendees. Railfanning

Toledo is ranked among the top ten cities in the country for railfanning. 

BTR#2- "The Christmas Kit"... It's a sweltering July day and here we are thinking about this years' upcoming "big one". Although we've launched the first two kits of the "1 of 500" series we haven't put out a "big box" (in our case, a "big wooden box") kit in two years. With the glut of "craftsman" structures on the market we just didn't see a reason to do a yearly release and had decided to keep it to every two years. There are only so many of these things we all have time to build (and all-too-often "collect") so we thought it would be better to skip every other year, keeping the "kit" a little more special and giving you guys a break from the craziness of the "annual decision making".

About the new Kit... It'll be "HO" scale (of course), it'll consist of 4 structural elements, and will go together to make an entire diorama. The components will be made of wood, white metal, plastic, and resin. The kit is designed for either a land-based or waterfront based operation and can incorporate the use of tracks to complete the scene if you prefer (we used a track on our prototype, you don't have to). The kit will have the usual Bar Mills value, we figure it at this point to be WELL UNDER \$300. Photos will be released in the beginning of September, the kit will ship (as usual) just before Christmas.

YES, it will come in the custom wooden boxed we used for both "Gritty McDuff's" & "Raglan Road" (both of those kits have been long sold-out). Although we normally run about 450 kits this year we're gonna keep it down to about 350. You will be able to order as many as 3 kits, but we'd prefer you'd only order one, these kits are not being produced for the benefit of E-Bay brokers, it's being built for the other guys in the hobby.

That's it. We make these guarantees... The kit will be distinctive, be well engineered, and be a great value.... something we still think is important here at Bar Mills.

That's it, stay tuned, if you're a BMSM fan and want to pre-order this kit you'll be able to once the photos are posted, but not before. Shipping will be about \$10 within the CONT-US. We'll have a new "Moose" coming along shortly with news of some new "O" & "S" scale offerings as well. Well, time to mow the lawn... Merry Christmas! Art Fahie, BMSM

BTR#3- Hi, Editors - The 2008 National convention is over, and several important decisions came out of the Board meeting there. You'll be hearing about most of those decisions in "Scale Rails." However, one decision that may directly impact you is the new decision to raise the annual subscription rate of "Scale Rails." If you're currently running an NMRA subscription or renewal form in your newsletter, as of October 1, 2008 you'll have to adjust the rates for memberships that include the magazine. Here's the official word from the Board: "In order to keep up with rapidly escalating costs for printing and distribution, the Board approved a new rate of \$19 (US members) per annual subscription of 'Scale Rails.'" Remember, this is still quite a value, considering "Scale Rails" is typically 72 pages and full-color. In fact, a subscription comes to less than \$2 per month. So, bottom line: after October 1, the new annual NMRA dues rate with a "Scale Rails" subscription will be \$55. Please adjust your subscription or renewal form!

From the TCA Members site: Lost railroad cars

Just to toss in my own little tale of a lost or misplaced railroad car: Around the time I moved to Indianapolis in January 1964, The Milwaukee Road decided to take up it's eastern most trackage in Indiana, which was the former Chicago Terre Haute and Southeastern which the Milw had acquired first through lease in 1921. With trackage going as far east as Seymour, IN, the Milw became the eastern most of any West Coast railroad, and was the only railroad in the U.S. to operate in four time zones. The primary business for the road was stone and coal from Southern Indiana, although other freight, both inbound and outbound was shipped as well. Eventually the demand for the bulk commodities, as well as the available supply petered out, the line became non-productive and the decision was made to abandon part of it.

The day that the last train was dispatched to run on the line, a switch crew was instructed to run those last few miles to pick up any freight cars that might have been left standing on a spur, a siding, a branch line or in any yard. The next activity was to be the wrecking crew that would tear up those tracks, thus isolating any car that might have been left. Well, as the crew traveled slowly down the last few miles, they came upon an old spur that switched off of the line and then traveled away, and out of sight of the "main" line. First one of the crew said that no one had used that spur in many years and they should just forget it and go on to the next one. Turns out the spur was over a mile long and had served a stone quarry that had long been abandoned. Small trees were growing up through the tracks, but the conductor said, "Nope; the boss said that we've got to run over every inch of the trackage on the line and that's what we're going to do". So with some difficulty they were able to throw the rusty old switch and started down the line. As they proceeded they couldn't even see through the foliage that they were knocking down and pushing out of the way, but when they finally got to the end of the spur, low and behold, there was a sealed box car sitting there, completely unaccounted for!

Well, they coupled on to it and with much groaning, creaking and squeaking, they got the car out to the main line. They reported it to dispatch by the car number and could find no record of it. As I mentioned, the car was sealed with one of those stainless steel, locking seals that no railroad man would dare open without "permission from the boss". Again, the dispatcher's office could not find any record of the car by number, not even in the U.S. freight car registry. So, finally "the boss" gave them permission to break the seal and find out if there was anything in the car.

They could hardly believe their eyes when they finally slid open the double doors. The car was filled with four brand new Pontiacs, completely undriven! Only, this was 1964 when they discovered the car and the four Pontiacs were brand new 1947 models! Apparently on their way to a Pontiac dealer somewhere in Southern Indiana the car was set out, temporarily, at the beginning of that quarry spur while the train went elsewhere to switch on the line. The brakes on the automobile car bled off and released themselves and there was a slight, almost imperceptible grade on the spur line and the car quietly rolled off to the end of the spur, and into history. I have no idea what happened to the Pontiacs!

This story was related to me by the late Vane Jones, the original founder of "O" SCALE Railroading, the predecessor of our O Gauge Railroading, only a few years after the original incident occurred. I have no reason to doubt it, as incredible as it may seem, because after that time I have also heard of other cars that got lost in some odd way, only to be found many years later. A friend of mine once told me of a car, set out on the "RIP track" in Butler, WI on the C&NW, was lost track of and was not discovered until many years later, even though the car was right there, in relatively plain sight, in an active railroad yard. It was supposed to have contained military vehicles.

So, if you have a long branch line on your layout, maybe it would be prototypical to just leave an old box car sitting at the end of it, "forgotten" by the rest of your operating crews. Great stories could be told to your visitors about the contents of that car!
