

Hello again! Let's continue some discussions on ideas to improve our Division attendance and involvement of members.....

We need to take our meetings "on the road" -My own Division 9 looks for opportunities to travel during the "good driving months" to see things, meet at something new or different for our meeting, visit layouts and historical items related to railroads, these are planned outings. We try to schedule a meeting in Sturgis, MI every so often because there are a number of Division 9 members living there. There are railroad operations in Sturgis, a historical railroad museum there, a model railroad club, and other things to see. I know Division 4 tries to meet in Holland and Muskegon (maybe Grand Haven in the future) besides the greater Grand Rapids area. I mentioned going to Coldwater this coming June for a steam train ride. Maybe in the future, Division 9 will try to go to Owosso, MI for a steam train ride as a group. Next September, Division 9 will hold its September meeting (our "annual" business meeting) at the Vicksburg, MI Train Station and Historical Society facilities. We met a while back with the Michiana Division in Hartford, MI at the West Michigan Railroad "transload yard & facilities" for a tour and presentation. Maybe even a day out trip to a busy location for rail fanning and railroad photos. My old Eastern Iowa Division used to meet in the summer at a spot with a community building by the UP RR "mainline tracks" for a day of bring a project to work on, enjoy fellowship, watch and photograph UP trains going by and cook burgers on a grill for lunch with people bring food to share and pass. It was a great fun day meeting!

Layout tours -

Layout tours can be broken up into different groups. They can be by scale; railroads modelled (focus on one railroad like the CSX or GTW); home layouts vs club layouts *Division 9 did a trip to the Grand Rapids area to see 4 back-to-back club layouts); era of the layout (transition period vs modern era vs the beginning of railroads, WWI or II era or Civil War era), maybe by industry modelled (I have seen some pretty neat layouts focused on coal mining or iron ore mining or forestry/timber operations); beginning of construction, middle of construction or finished/completed (I know there is no such thing as a "completed" model railroad); a railroad that focuses on all steam or all diesel power; model railroads that focus on railroads of Europe or Asia.

Industry tours (prototype tours) –

How about trying to schedule a field trip to an industry to learn how they make stuff and include railroad traffic into their operations. I know this can be tough due to manufacturing secrets, safety on the tour (need for safety



glasses, hearing protection, work boots and long sleeve shirts and pants), having people that can take us around (everybody is busy and short staffed), weather, parking, security, etc. Also the companies have difficulty understanding our wants and needs (what's a model railroad, you guys do what) and the old question of "can we take photos"?

Show off your favorite photos, images and videos meeting –

Have everybody bring in 5 minutes or 10 minutes of their favorite 35mm slides, PowerPoint slides, movies and videos. Tell us about what you saw, what you like, tell us a fun story, how these images relate to your layout or operations or why you took these images or visited this location to take these images! The challenge to this meeting is having the equipment to project the images. 35mm slide projector, what the heck is that these days, videos, movie projectors, videos, etc., what members have in the equipment at home.

Hosting a "hands-on" clinic -

This could be on any topic. Division 9 just hosted a "weathering railroad cars" clinic. Division 9 purchased the materials needed, members brought inside railroad cars to "practice on", we had a seasoned veteran instructor lead the clinic and processes. Everybody enjoyed the time and clinic and went home with some "weathered: railroad cars. Topics and projects such as scratch building of building, installing decoders, repairing and tuning up engines, making water on your layout, lighting of buildings, building trees, making snow for your layout, painting backdrops, and the list could go on and on!

"Zoom" does come with a cost for somebody and you can have problems with equipment, links, and limited internet signal.

An "all-day" meeting with a theme -








IN MEMORIAM NCR STORY

Model Railroad Control Panels by Barry Hensel NCR MODELING

This article will look at different styles and construction of control panels for your model railroad. The vast majority of layouts use control panels to mount electrical switches to control turnouts or track power. As with many subjects in our great hobby, there are several ways and methods of doing a task. With the help of several friends, let's look at some control panels, their features and construction. As you can see from these pictures, control panels can vary in mounting type, size, color, and function. Some are mounted flat or on an angle for easier viewing. Some are surface mounted or recessed into the fascia. The style is strictly up to you, the layout owner!








Here are a few more examples of control panels. As we said at the start, there is no wrong way to make a control panel. It is customized to your layout and needs!





Let's take a close-up look at some types and the construction of some panels..... Friend Joe Bliss

designed his using a "Paint program", then printed them on 8-1/2 X 11" full sheet label paper. He applied that to 1/8" thick sign plastic sheets, and drilled holes for toggles/LED indicators for turnouts. Joe uses control panels for turnout control.



Friend Norm Logan uses control panels for track power. His layout started as DC block control and when he switched to DCC he kept the panels and block controls. Now all block controls are switched to the same position for DCC operation. But, if a problem occurs he can still isolate a section of track to find and fix the problem. He also has toggle switches to simply turn power on/off to sidings or yard tracks.





Norm's panels are all hinged and have a simple hook connector to hold them closed. Open the hook, swing the panel out for maintenance!


Friend Chris Elliott has a combo control panel. It controls both track power for DC block control and turnout control for powered turnouts. Note the use of different color tape for different type of track – mainline vs sidings. This panel framework is plywood and the panel itself is painted sheet metal.







Friend Terry Suetterlin uses 0.40 sheet metal, painted and track lines with pinstripe tape. His panel is flush mounted to the fascia board and controls DC track power only. The colored dots are for the different cabs. The controllers are color coded to match. Terry's layout is N scale.



Here is how a flush fascia mounted panel could be constructed. You have to build the plastic or metal panel first with your track plan and switches mounted. Once you have the panel located on your layout fascia, you need to mark and drill holes in your fascia and benchwork so that the switches can stick through. Then, mount your panel to the layout with some screws.




Fellow members of the RAIL GANG Ted Pilchak and Walt Plentis are both using a common design angled control panels attached to the fascia. What is interesting is that they extended the base to be a small shelf to hold uncoupling tools or a coffee cup! The actual panels are plastic with pinstripe tape for the track diagrams. The panels control turnouts.






Here is a simple way to make a panel, similar to what Joe Bliss did. You build a framework and attach to the benchwork, then sandwich a piece of hardboard, the printed track plan and a clear plastic sheet protector to protect the printed track plan. How to get holes for electrical switches? The best way would be to punch the holes into the printed plan and the clear plastic together, then once it's all mounted, drill through the hardboard.

Here is another popular way to construct a control panel. Using plywood cut to a triangle shape gives you the angle of the panel. The framework then easily mounts to your benchwork and a plexiglass panel mounts to the framework to complete the panel. A large hole or slot cut into the plywood back allows wiring to get from the panel to the layout.



Here is a control panel from Div 6 member Byrne Blumenstein and it's a bit unusual. This is a simple open fronted shadow box that provides a perimeter frame to provide some additional protection against bumping accidentally into the switches. More uniquely, it's mounted using the frame from a drop down cookbook holder mechanism. This provides the ability to safely retract the panel when not needed up into the benchwork, but project it out, at an angle for better visibility, when access is needed.









Here is another interesting control panel from Byrne. While it's construction is fairly normal, it's the technology that makes this one different. Again, using a pre-made shadow box, but fully enclosed with a glass frame face. In this case, he attached TouchToggle switches to the back of the glass behind a sheet of paper with the route on it, rather than toggle switches, eliminating the need for any drilling of the face panel, and dramatically reducing the wiring effort. The TouchToggle senses your finger tip on the glass, so there is nothing to damage, move accidentally, or get dirty. Additionally, as you can see, by adding a piano hinge to the face panel, the switch power and control circuitry rests safely inside the shadow box itself. The box itself is angled using a closet wire shelf angle bracket.



Here's the Reading Lines - Central Division way to do control panels! I like recessed and smooth panels. These take a bit more work, but I feel they're worth it. First, Construction, here's a cross section of how they are mounded to the layout....



The trick to smooth panels is to do everything on the back. The difficult part is that you have to think "backwards" because it is on the back! Draw a sketch of your panel on a clear film, then turn it over, that is how you will "draw" on the back side of the plastic. Using pinstripe tape, draw out your track plan. Using masking tape, tape off areas where you will have instructions, logos, labels, you must know the size of these areas. Last, carefully drill any holes needed for mounting screws and electrical switches.




The next step is to paint the back of the panel the color you want it to be. In my case, I used the same latex paint that I used on the fascia. I even rolled it on for a smooth finish. Once that has dried, pry-up all of the tape for your track plan. Then you can paint those areas the color you want the track to be. If you want different colors for mainline vs sidings, only peal-up the tape for the main line and paint that first, then do the rest in the other color. Once all the paint for track is dry, carefully peal-up

the tape for the labels, instructions and logo areas. They should be clear "windows"!





For all of your labels, instructions and logos.... Using a program like powerpoint to make those is easy and quick. Make all that you need, print them out on color paper if you want them to be colored and cut them out a bit larger than the actual image. NOTE, the image must be just a bit smaller than your clear windows in your panels. Once you have them all cut out, go to your panel and using masking tape, place the labels in the windows from the back side of the panel. Once it is in position, use duct tape to cover it all to hold it in place! Now is the time to mount your electrical switches and do some wiring. Then mount the panel to its place on your layout.





Finish the wiring and you are done! You now have smooth and nice looking custom control panels! For an added feature, you could mount some small lights above the panel, on the backside of your benchwork, to make it a "lighted" panel!

WHEN FISH RODE THE RAILS

In recent times, Americans' taste for fresh fish has led to serious overfishing in many parts of the country. But this is not a new problem. As early as the mid nineteenth century, wild fishery stocks were seen to be dwindling as a result of overfishing, and the construction of dams that cut off access to the fishes' upstream spawning grounds.

The U.S. Fish Commission, a forerunner of the U.S. Fish and Wildlife service, was established in 1871. Congress soon charged the new Commission with the task of "supplementing declining native stocks of coastal and lake food fish through fish propagation" by expanding the habitats of Eastern species into the American West. In 1873 Dr. Livingston Stone, of the Fish Commission's Baird Station fish hatchery in California, was tasked with safely transporting 35,000 Hudson River shad fry, by rail, from the East coast to the Sacramento River. The fish were carried in ordinary ten-gallon milk cans with Stone changing the water every two hours. Most of the shad fry survived and the trip was judged to be a success.

More transcontinental fish carrying trips followed. Over time, Stone and his colleagues developed improved techniques to keep the fish safe and healthy on their long journey. The milk cans were cooled by ice. At first, Stone hired fellow passengers to aerate the fishes' water by hand. Later, a simple aerator device was developed. It was understood that the water had to be kept free of slime and impurities. To that end, the fish were not fed for a few days before their trip.

The fish were accompanied on these early trips by attendants called 'messengers' who needed their own food and accommodation. It soon became evident that the ordinary baggage cars that were being used were not ideal for this job. So, in 1881, the Commission purchased its first dedicated 'fish car', shown below, a Pennsylvania Railroad baggage car specifically fitted out for carrying fish and their attendants across the country.



So successful was this car that, in 1882, the Commission ordered Fish Car No. 2, from the B&O, for \$7,334. It was fitted with special compartments to hold ice and was reinforced so it could carry as much as 20,000 pounds of fish, water, and equipment at passenger train speeds.

A third Fish Car was built in 1884 and added to the fleet. This car could carry not only fish but also fish eggs which could be hatched in transit. A replica of Fish Commission car No.3 is displayed at the D.C. Booth Historic National Fish Hatchery and Archives in Spearfish, SD.



Fish Car No.4 arrived in 1893. Eventually, the Bureau of Fisheries, as it was later called, had a total of ten dedicated Fish Cars. At first, the railroads had been eager to have the Fish Cars run over their lines. Stocking lineside streams with game fish was seen as a way to encourage tourist traffic on their lines. But as the cars became heavier than ordinary passenger cars, some railroads began to view them as potentially dangerous. Fish Car No. 4, for example, weighed 42,780 pounds. One of the heaviest railroad cars in the country, it was blamed for a 1911 wreck near Bridgeport, Connecticut, which killed 13 people and injured 48. The cars generally operated from April through November with the rest of the year reserved for maintenance. They crisscrossed the country, sometimes on trips as long as 10 days, travelling millions of miles and transporting billions of fish, with losses of only 1 percent. The 'modern' Fish Car era began in 1916 with the first steel car, No. 7, having a fish-carrying capacity of 50 percent greater than the previous wooden cars.

The railroads were converting to heavyweight steel passenger equipment and they were becoming reluctant to run wood cars in their fast, all-steel trains.


Fish transportation technology was also changing. The traditional 10-gallon milk cans were succeeded by new lightweight containers called "Fearnow" pails, patented in 1922 and named for their inventor Edgar Fearnow. These containers, seen in the interior view of a fish car shown below, weighed only 5 pounds but could carry twice as many fish as the older milk cans, while taking up half the space. Moreover, each "Fearnow" pail had a special built-in compartment for ice to keep the water cool.



The last Fish Car built, No. 10, was added to the fleet in 1929. It was an 81-foot-long heavyweight that could hold 325 pails containing 34,000 3-inch fish or 500,000 1-inch fish. It had an onboard generator to operate all the equipment, including electric aerating devices. But, while No.10 was impressive, it was built at the beginning of the end of the fish car era. In 1928, 27,000 brook and rainbow trout had been transported by airplane from Northville, Michigan, to Dayton, Ohio, without a single loss. And it was becoming evident that trucks could transport fish cheaper and more efficiently than the traditional fish cars. By 1933, 17 percent of the output of hatcheries was hauled by truck. By 1940, only three fish cars were still operating. The last one, No.10, was taken out of service in 1947, marking the end of the Fish Car era for the Bureau of Fisheries.

While the Bureau of Fisheries cars were the best

known of the railroad Fish Cars, theirs were not the only ones on the rails. Several states operated their own fish cars including California, Kansas, Michigan, Missouri, Montana, Nebraska, New York, and Wisconsin, and perhaps others. Michigan's car, the Wolverine is seen here.



Little information seems to be available on state owned Fish Cars. However, Wisconsin's Badger II has survived and is displayed at the Mid-Continent Railway Museum in North Freedom, WI. It was given full restoration, completed in 2008, to bring the car back to its as-built configuration, complete with fish storage tanks.



But perhaps the most unusual railroad Fish Cars were those belonging to Chicago's Shedd Aguarium. While the aguarium was under construction it was decided that a custom-built rail car would best meet the institution's needs for specialized transport of specimens for display. Built in 1929 by the Pullman Car Works for about \$40,000, the car, named Nautilus, was custom fitted with cypress and metal containers for marine animals and a life-support system of pumps, air compressors, and electric refrigeration coils with steam heat to transport fresh and saltwater fish and invertebrates from cold, temperate, and tropical waters. Fully loaded, the car carried 4,500 gallons of water. It also had modest living quarters for the six-person collecting crew.

The Nautilus only racked up an average 20,000 miles a year, far less than the Fish Commission's cars and it did not carry fish by the thousands but it did transport unusual and exotic sea creatures from around the world to their new home in America's Midwest.

In 1959 the aging heavyweight Nautilus was replaced with the lighter, higher-speed, stainless steel Nautilus II. This car began life as Chicago and Eastern Illinois car 304, "Turkey Run". It was converted by the Thrall Car Manufacturing Company to carry saltwater creatures to Chicago. The Nautilus II ran until 1972. It has been preserved at the Monticello Railway Museum in Monticello, IL.



The Fish Car era began in the 19th century when it was thought that conservation of natural species could be promoted through scientific interventions that could help both nature and civilization with no apparent downside. The 21st century recognition of the damage that often results from the introduction of non-native species into an environment likely never crossed the minds of Dr. Stone and his contemporaries.

Editor Note - if you have it in your files... check out the Autumn 2014 issue of the HotBox. There was a one page article on "Fish Cars" by Rich Mahaney. Some additional info and pictures of those cars that are in Michigan.





I model an area of Michigan's Upper Peninsula called the "Copper Country" and have included the mining town of Mohawk. Some of the residents of Mohawk were of Finnish descent, and wherever there were Finns, there were saunas. I needed to have one. As you might expect, there we no commercial kits that even resembled a real sauna, so I decided to scratch build one.



I found a number of pictures on the internet, with varying sizes and of different materials, but this sauna shown on the Minnesota History web site caught my attention. Some of the specific characteristics of this Sauna are that it is a "Savusauna" or black sauna meaning there is no smoke vent. Also notice that the door is smaller than normal. (They were usually only about 4 feet high, which helped keep in more heat. Some saunas had an attached changing room, but I chose not to model that.

A sauna is not the same as a steam bath, the heat is dry. (Think... Arizona in August). However, at times, a ladle full of water might be splashed on the hot rocks to help increase the temperature. I have also heard stories of some liquid "medicine" being splashed on the rocks to help clear the sinuses.

To prepare a sauna for use, first a fire was built in the "stove", and kept until the rocks in the sauna were hot. (3 to 5 hours). The temperature could reach between 190 and 212 degrees, but usually is kept between 150 and 195. The fire was then removed, the upper windows closed, and the soot was brushed off of the benches. A "typical" sauna would last about 45 to 60 minutes. The bathers would wait until the broke a good sweat, whisk

themselves with branches (Birch was popular), then rinse, and get dressed. The rinse would be a bucket of water, or maybe a dip in Lake Superior. In the winter, a snow bank was a viable alternative.

For my model, the only commercial parts are the door hinges, the figure, and the shingles. The walls were built from scale 6x6, 6x12 while the other wooden parts were scale 2x4, 2x6 and scribed sheets. The firebox was cast from plaster with aquarium rocks added to the top.


The process goes something like this: Step 1 - Stain the wood pieces and cut to length.




Step 2 - Notch the timbers. The notches should be as wide as the timber and half as deep.



Step 3 - Dry-fitting helps to visualize how the timbers interlock at the corners.



Step 4 - Assemble the walls.



Because the timbers interlock, build all 4 walls together. Start with a 6x6 on the bottom, then add a 6x12 timber for each side, then the next row on top of that. Cut the door opening as you add rows. Then add the final 3 rows on top. Add the trim around the door.

Step 5 – Cut the floor from a sheet of scribed siding to fit inside the walls, with a large opening for the firepit. Add bracing to the underside of the floor to bring it level with the door opening.

(The wood across the top will be the ridge pole.)



Step 6 – To make the job of building multiple roof trusses easier, build a jig on a scrap of hardboard, and cut all of the pieces needed at the same time. Build more than you need. They will be useful in shaping the end peaks.






Step 7 - Assemble the trusses, and attach them to the ridge pole, being sure that they are all plumb and square.



Step 8 – Using an extra truss as a pattern, cut the timbers for the peaked ends to match the trusses and attach them to the end walls. Include trusses covering the edges.



Step 9 - After verifying that the trusses fit inside the end walls and matched up with the sides, measure and cut the roof from scribed siding. Attach the roof with the scribing facing down to simulate individual boards, and add your favorite roofing material.

Step 10 – Build a U-shaped mold for the firebox from some scrap pieces of square material. (Plastruct tube was used here). Then fill the mold with plaster. Add aquarium pebbles to the top.



Step 11 – Make the benches from pieces of scribed siding and scale 2x4s, and the steps from scale 6x12s. Each sauna was different, so you can include 1 or 2 different levels of benches.



Step 12 – Fashion a door from scribed siding and use hinges to attach it to building.



Finally, for my sauna, I weathered the outside and added a few Preiser figures.
